

ADAIR COUNTY COMMISSION MINUTES
FRIDAY, APRIL 3, 2020
1-AST DAY APRIL REGULAR

The Adair County Commission convened at 8:30 a.m. on April 3, 2020 in the Courthouse at Kirksville. All Commissioners were present.

At 10:15 a.m., the County Commission met with Adair County Sheriff, Robert Hardwick; Adair County Prosecuting Attorney, Matt Wilson, Adair County Health Director, Jim LeBaron; and Adair County Clerk, Sandra Collop. The meeting took place at the Adair County Annex building.

It was reported that there were now 7 active cases of COVID-19 in Adair County due to testing on March 23, 2020. There are 10 cases total. The hospital has reported they have 14 ventilators on hand.

Discussion ensued to determine whether the County should issue an ordinance addressing the COVID-19 issue. Mr. Wilson passed out Ordinance 2020-2 pertaining to social distancing that he had written as well as a press release. He said that many have taken the right path regarding social distancing. Some are getting benefits that some are not. The Health Department was now in charge of enforcement via a Division of Health and Human Services' order. That will provide contact tracing and other benefits for Adair County. It is civil enforcement with no teeth in it. How do you enforce that? Law Enforcement is not working to increase citations just to continue the ordinance. Need to encourage people to do the right thing and disarm the situation. Law Enforcement does that all the time. It takes one person to be infected to take to another essential business to pass it on. The virus lasts for a long time and you will always have those that will not socially distance. To protect the group, you need to start ramping up the education and heighten the seriousness of the situation. People are beginning to realize that this is a problem. Mr. Wilson agreed with the Sheriff that this was not enough. They felt the County was in uncharted waters. It was a community problem and they needed to walk a fine line. More people were beginning to wear face masks. Sheriff Hardwick was torn about implementing the order. Other counties had merely adopted the Center for Disease Control (CDC) requirements. It was mentioned that Walmart was directing traffic flow within their store and Aldi no longer allows kids at their stores.

Mr. Wilson stated that the ordinance he has written mirrors that of the City of Kirksville and adopts the CDC guidelines. The only change removed the enforcement from the Health Department to the Sheriff's Department. Commissioner Shahan said the County was looking to at least a 30-day minimum for the ordinance. Sheriff Hardwick felt that stores needed to take responsibility to police their stores.

Breaking up groups of peoples was then discussed. Mr. Wilson thought there was nothing they could do. The people could all be in the same household. The City Chief was getting phone calls. Right now, there is not repercussions. Perhaps Law Enforcement should drive by. He thought it might help if people were not in a group. He feels if there are teeth in the ordinance, they will pay more attention. People increase the risk expediently by being in groups. We do not want to arrest and write citations. If you do not, however, there could be repercussions and we do not want to go there.

Sheriff Hardwick thought corporate stores should be addressed. Maybe a letter could be sent to them. The Health Department could send brick and mortar stores a letter.

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Mr. Wilson discussed the necessity to sometimes have more than one family member in the grocery store. He thought the letter should be sent to every business in Adair County to avoid discrimination. Commissioner King suggested the Health Department do a press release. Sheriff Hardwick said the corporate stores may not want to comply due to their size. How will this ordinance make them do that? We already have an existing problem of 15 or more kids in a group at Wal-Mart. Mr. Wilson thought closing early curtailed that.

Sheriff Hardwick asked about an end date for the ordinance. Mr. Wilson said there should not be one at this time. Commissioner Shahan suggested reviewing it weekly. Mr. LeBaron suggested 30 days. Commissioner King suggested no end date as no one knows when this will end. Mr. Wilson said that deadlines are always being pushed back. Read the ordinance. It is not a stay home order. People do not read.

Commissioner Thompson then asked to read a statement to the group. He began: "The purpose of this ordinance is to create an informed public, not to imprison our citizens. It was never intended to be a repulsive stay-at-home mandate. Common sense is a flower that does not grow in everybody's garden. 90% plus of the county's population are already demonstrating preventive measures not only to save themselves but to protect their neighbors. I believe we should treat people like you want to be treated. Prevention can be economically expensive for some, but a lack of caution can cause the death of you or our neighbor. Do you want that on your conscience? I am opposed to \$1,000 penalty. You cannot fix stupid. Similar ordinances throughout Missouri have been described as a big dog with a small bite and compliance is based on the honor system." Mo Revised Statute 192.300 was also referred to which includes language on violation of an ordinance.

Mr. Wilson stated that the Commission has not taken this lightly. Last Friday they began discussions. They started working with the City and looking at other county ordinances. However, the increase in numbers on Wednesday morning speeded this up. People are frustrated with the situation. He appreciates County government and the three Commissioners as a citizen and a parent. He appreciates the need for social distancing. This is not a cure-all and is not a quarantine order. It can be put on the website. We need to be pro-active and not depend on the media. We need to take on this responsibility.

Sheriff Hardwick suggested a news release - educate the public and have a face with each sentence. Put it on Facebook. Wash your hands. I have people that will help. A public service announcement means more from community members.

Mr. Wilson also suggested a public service announcement. Sheriff Hardwick said we need to convince box stores to give instructions. Mr. Wilson said the County should use cable TV, KTVO Television, radio, and share it on Facebook. We could increase the social media.

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Mr. Wilson read the ordinance. It was reviewed and changes were suggested and included. Slight changes had already been sent to everyone regarding paragraph one. Commissioner Shahan was not in favor of telling residents what to do or not do. He did not know what the effects on small business would be. The ordinance was necessary and would not be in force very long. We care about the community. Sheriff Hardwick wanted the language "are ordered to stay at home" softened. Mr. Wilson said he has been in discussions with John Slavin, Attorney for City of Kirksville. We can make changes as we go along.

Commissioner Shahan then moved to accept Ordinance 2020-2. Commissioner Thompson seconded the motion. Commissioner King concurred. All voted in favor of the motion.

Further discussion ensued regarding the date and time the ordinance would go into effect. It was agreed upon by all in attendance, that verbiage would be added to the last sentence of the last page to include the date and time the ordinance would go into effect.

Commissioner Bill King then moved to amend the previously approved ordinance to change all start dates in the ordinance to 12:01 a.m., Monday, April 6, 2020. Commissioner Thompson seconded the motion. Commissioner Shahan concurred. All voted in favor of the motion.

Changes will be made, signatures obtained, and copies distributed accordingly.

The meeting ended at 12:40 p.m.

The Commission spoke with the Edgar Law Firm regarding a petition they wanted to file on behalf of Adair County, Missouri seeking redress for the societal and financial damage it has suffered at the hands of those directly responsible for the crisis – the manufacturers and distributors of prescription opioids.

The Commission reviewed the petition and will go forward after removing Walgreens and Hy Vee businesses from the verbiage. Presiding Commissioner Shahan gave verbal approval to the changes. The petition will be revised, filed, and sent back to the Commission before the 13th of April 2020.

At 2:00 p.m., fuel bids were reviewed for the Adair County Road and Bridge Department. Two bids were received – one from MFA Oil Company as well as Praireland FS Inc. Both bids were received by e-mail. After discussion, Commissioner Thompson moved not to accept either bid and to research other avenues to obtain bids for fuel. Commissioner Shahan seconded the motion. Commissioner King concurred. All voted in favor of the motion. The Commission will notify the bidders of their decision.


The Adair County Commission adjourned at 4:00 p.m. on April 3, 2020.

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IN REF. ORDER NO 4 Ordinance No. 2020-2 – “A Social Distancing Ordinance”

COUNTY OF ADAIR, MISSOURI ORDINANCE NO. 2020-2

An Ordinance of the County of Adair, State of Missouri in response to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (Covid-19) Pandemic- “A Social Distancing Ordinance”

WHEREAS, the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19) is considered an infectious, highly contagious communicable and dangerous disease and on March 11, 2020 was declared by the World Health Organization to be a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020 the President of the United States declared the outbreak of COVID-19 in the United States constitutes a national emergency and the Governor of the State of Missouri declared a state of emergency within in the State of Missouri; and

WHEREAS, on March 15, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (the “CDC”) in accordance with guidance for large events and mass gatherings, recommends private or public planned or spontaneous gatherings be limited in size to 50 people or less and that events with fewer than 50 people be permitted only if the organizers adhere to guidelines for protecting vulnerable populations, hand hygiene, and social distancing; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, Presidential Coronavirus Guidelines further recommends to avoid social gatherings in groups of more than 10 people and to avoid eating or drinking at bars, restaurants, and food courts, but are encouraged to use drive-thru, pickup, or delivery options; and

WHEREAS, the CDC guidance dated March 15, 2020 “is not intended to supersede the advice of local public health officials”, and

WHEREAS, on March 21, 2020, Missouri Governor Michael L. Parson directed Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) Director Dr. Randall Williams to order statewide social distancing; and

WHEREAS, the County Commission of the County of Adair, Missouri has the authority pursuant to the provisions of state law including, but not limited to, Section 192.300 RSMO. To make and promulgate orders, rules, or regulations, respectively as will tend to enhance the public health and prevent the entrance of infectious, contagious, communicable or dangerous diseases into the County of Adair, Missouri; and

WHEREAS, The Health Official of the County of Adair, Missouri has the authority pursuant to 19 CSR 20-20.040(2) (G) To... “Establish appropriate control measures which may include...the creation and enforcement of adequate orders to prevent the spread of the disease and other measures considered by the department and/or local health authority as appropriate disease control measures based upon the

disease...and any other available information related to the... disease or infection; and (5) Establish and maintain quarantine, isolation or other measures as required; and

WHEREAS, the Adair County Emergency Management Director and The Adair County Health Department Director acknowledge, recommend, and support this Order as outlined below; and

WHEREAS, to limit the spread of COVID-19, to protect the public health, and to provide essential protections to the citizens of the County of Adair, Missouri it is reasonable and necessary to impose limited and temporary restrictions on the use of certain places of public accommodation.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, by the County Commission of the County of Adair, Missouri that the below precautions and orders are necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Adair County, Missouri. The Adair County Commission, for the exercise of all necessary emergency authority does hereby ORDER and DECLARE the following:

1. All individuals currently living within the County of Adair are ordered to shelter in place except as allowed in this Ordinance. All persons may leave their homes or place of residence or if visiting the County as a non-resident only for Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, or to operate Essential Businesses and Operations, all as defined in this Ordinance.
 - a. To the extent individuals are using shared or outdoor space when outside their residence, they must at all times and as much as reasonably possible adhere to social distancing requirements.
 - b. Individuals experiencing homelessness are exempt from this Order but are strongly urged to obtain shelter. Individuals whose residence is unsafe or becomes unsafe, such as victims of domestic violence, are permitted and urged to leave their home and stay at a safe alternative location. For purposes of this Ordinance, homes or residences include hotels and motels.
2. All social gatherings, whether private or public, planned or spontaneous, be restricted to no more than 10 people. All places of public accommodation shall institute appropriate health and safety protections including social distancing techniques (e.g., requiring people to be at least six (6) feet apart; reducing the number of employees, customers or other people present; reducing face-to-face contact; using phone calls, virtual meetings, and drop-offs/curb-side, pickups rather than in-person contact).
3. The following places of public accommodation are to be closed to entering, exiting, use and occupancy by members of the public as outlined below:
 - A. Restaurants, food establishments, food courts, cafes, coffee houses, and other places of public accommodation offering food or beverage for on-premises consumption; and
 - B. Bars, taverns, brew pubs, breweries, microbreweries, distilleries, wineries, tasting rooms, special licensees, clubs, and other places of public accommodation offering alcoholic beverages for on-premises consumption.
4. Every place of public accommodation described in paragraph 2 is encouraged to offer food and beverage services to the public using delivery service, window service, walk-up service, drive-

through service, or so long as every such person involved implements appropriate precautions to decrease the potential transmission of COVID-19, including social distancing techniques.

5. In offering food or beverage service, every place of public accommodation described in paragraph 2 or the subparagraphs, contained therein, may permit up to ten (10) members of the public at one time in the place of public accommodation for the purpose of picking up their food or beverage orders, as long as any member of the public is at least six (6) feet apart from other people while on the premises. Adair County shall not enforce any provision of an ordinance, permit, or other restriction that would as applied to this specific circumstance, prohibit an existing restaurant or bar from providing delivery service, window service, walk-up service, drive-through service, or drive-up service during the state of emergency.
6. All places of public amusement, whether indoors or outdoors, including but not limited to, locations with amusement rides, carnivals, amusement parks, water parks, roller skating rinks, museums, arcades, fairs, children's play centers, playgrounds (including children's play structures in public or private parks), funplexes, bowling alleys, movie and other theaters, concert and music halls, and country clubs, golf clubs (with the narrow exceptions of playing golf where there is no shared equipment by the participants and driving ranges where social distancing requirements are strictly followed and enforced), social clubs and athletic clubs shall be closed to the public. An exception shall exist for outdoor parks and trails where no shared equipment is utilized by the patrons.
7. Due to the high risk of community spread at such events, Essential Activities do not include weddings, funerals, wakes, memorial services or similar gatherings. All such events or gatherings shall be limited, shall not exceed ten persons (including any clergy or other persons present participating in the ceremony), and shall comply with Social Distancing Requirements. All public parks and open outdoor recreation areas are encouraged to remain open and to be used by the public so long as social distancing requirements are strictly followed. Because playgrounds may increase the spread of COVID-19, all playgrounds shall be closed with appropriate notices posted.

Leaving the home for Essential Activities is permitted. For purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence for Essential Travel only to perform Essential Activities, as defined below, which are specifically related to health and safety, the procurement of necessary supplies and services, for outdoor activity, for certain types of work and to care for others. When engaging in any outdoor activity, individuals must comply with Social Distancing Requirements. Public transit shall be used only for purposes of performing Essential Activities or to travel to and from work to operate Essential Businesses, Healthcare Operations, or to maintain Essential Governmental Functions or Minimum Basic Operations. People riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements. This Order allows travel into or out of the County to perform Essential Activities, operate Essential Businesses, or maintain Essential Governmental Functions or Minimum Basic Operations.

Schools and Social Services Providing Food. Schools and other entities that ordinarily provide food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Order provided that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a delivery or pick-up and take-away basis only.

Schools and other entities, other than childcare facilities, that provide food services under this paragraph shall not permit the food to be eaten onsite.

Exemptions. All 911 call center employees, fire personnel, corrections personnel, healthcare employees, hazardous material responders from government or the private sector, workers maintaining digital systems infrastructure supporting law enforcement and emergency service operations, first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, law enforcement personnel, and people designated by the applicable governing authority are necessary in the performance of Essential Government Functions are exempt from this Order to the extent such people are performing these functions.

Access to Essential Governmental Functions. Nothing in this Order shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing Essential Governmental Functions.

Definitions For purposes of this order, these terms, regardless of whether capitalized, are defined as follows:

- A. “Business” or “businesses” means any for-profit companies, non-profit organizations, benevolent associations, limited liability companies, or partnerships, regardless of legal organization, form, entity, tax treatment, or structure;
- B. “CDC” means the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention of the United States Department of Health and Human Services;
- C. “County” means all areas of Adair County, Missouri;
- D. “Disqualified Businesses” means any Essential Business that is disqualified from being an Essential Business, by order of the Director, or by judicial decree or court order;
- E. “Essential Activities” means activities that are necessary for a person to:
 1. act or perform tasks essential to any person's health and/or safety, or to the health and/or safety of their family, household members, or pets, including but not limited to obtaining medical supplies or medication, visiting a health care professional, obtaining supplies needed to work from home, or laundering clothing;
 2. obtain Necessary Services or Supplies for themselves and their family, household members, or pets, or to deliver Necessary Services or Supplies to others;
 3. engage in Essential Travel;
 4. shop for grocery products, food, beverages, or other household and consumer products (for example, cleaning or personal care products including but not limited to products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation, communication, and the essential operation of Residences);

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5. engage in services or perform work necessary to operate or maintain Essential Critical Infrastructure;
 6. engage in outdoor activity (including walking, hiking, running, or biking) to the extent reasonably consistent with Social Distancing Requirements (including, for example, walking outdoors six feet away from another person not of your household);
 7. participate in religious services and other spiritual practices but only to the extent consistent with reasonable compliance with Social Distancing Requirements and gathering size limitations;
 8. acts consisting of providing Essential Products and Services to a Residence, an Essential Business, or to a business in order for that business to maintain Minimum Basic Operations;
 9. activities at open construction sites, irrespective of types of structures, subject to applicable OSHA and other safety guidelines, and related architectural, design, and land surveying activities, so long as the people involved reasonably comply with Social Distancing Requirements to the extent consistent with applicable safety guidelines;
 10. necessary care for a dependent in the person's legal custody, including acts essential for a parent with legal custody to transfer the physical custody of a child;
 11. care for a family member in another household;
 12. engage in Essential Government Functions;
 13. engage in Healthcare Operations;
 14. engage in Essential Businesses;
 15. exercise constitutional rights to the extent that by so acting the person does not endanger the public health and safety or the health and safety of any person;
 16. acts consisting of providing Essential Products and Services to the federal government, the state government, or other political subdivision of the state of Missouri;
 17. act or perform tasks approved pursuant to an order of the Director.
- F. "Essential Businesses" means, with the exception of Disqualified Businesses, the following:
1. Healthcare Operations;
 2. Essential Critical Infrastructure;
 3. Essential Government Functions;
 4. grocery stores, farmers' markets, farm stands, produce stands, supermarkets, food banks, food pantries, convenience stores, or other establishments engaged in the retail sale of or providing canned food, dry goods, fruits, vegetables, pet supply, meats, fish, and poultry, or any household consumer

- products (e.g., cleaning or personal care products), including but not limited to stores that sell groceries and also sell other non-grocery products, and products necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of Residences; however, no dine in service is permitted;
5. businesses that engage in food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing;
 6. businesses that engage in food production, manufacturing, processing, packaging, wholesaling, storage, warehousing, or distribution;
 7. businesses that provide food, shelter, social services, or other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or people otherwise in need of social services (including but not limited to individuals with physical, intellectual, or developmental disabilities);
 8. newspapers, television stations, radio stations, and other media services, whether private or public;
 9. gas stations, auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities;
 10. banks, financial institutions, broker-dealers, asset managers, businesses that process payroll for any other business, and businesses that process financial transactions and services;
 11. trash collection and disposal;
 12. hardware stores;
 13. inns, hotels, motels, and bed and breakfast establishments; however, dine-in service at on-site restaurants and bars is not permitted;
 14. plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, communication, and essential operations of Residences, Healthcare Operations, Essential Critical Infrastructure, Essential Government Services, Essential Activities, or other Essential Businesses;
 15. businesses that perform construction services;
 16. businesses providing mailing and shipping services, including post office boxes;
 17. educational institutions, including public and private K-12 schools, colleges, and universities for purposes of facilitating distance learning, provided that Social Distancing Requirements are maintained to the greatest extent possible;
 18. businesses providing private security services in accordance with applicable laws;
 19. laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers;
 20. funeral homes, crematoriums, cremation, burial, mortuary services, and cemeteries;

- products (e.g., cleaning or personal care products), including but not limited to stores that sell groceries and also sell other non-grocery products, and products necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, and essential operation of Residences; however, no dine in service is permitted;
5. businesses that engage in food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing;
 6. businesses that engage in food production, manufacturing, processing, packaging, wholesaling, storage, warehousing, or distribution;
 7. businesses that provide food, shelter, social services, or other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or people otherwise in need of social services (including but not limited to individuals with physical, intellectual, or developmental disabilities);
 8. newspapers, television stations, radio stations, and other media services, whether private or public;
 9. gas stations, auto-supply, auto-repair, and related facilities;
 10. banks, financial institutions, broker-dealers, asset managers, businesses that process payroll for any other business, and businesses that process financial transactions and services;
 11. trash collection and disposal;
 12. hardware stores;
 13. inns, hotels, motels, and bed and breakfast establishments; however, dine-in service at on-site restaurants and bars is not permitted;
 14. plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the safety, sanitation, communication, and essential operations of Residences, Healthcare Operations, Essential Critical Infrastructure, Essential Government Services, Essential Activities, or other Essential Businesses;
 15. businesses that perform construction services;
 16. businesses providing mailing and shipping services, including post office boxes;
 17. educational institutions, including public and private K-12 schools, colleges, and universities for purposes of facilitating distance learning, provided that Social Distancing Requirements are maintained to the greatest extent possible;
 18. businesses providing private security services in accordance with applicable laws;
 19. laundromats, dry cleaners, and laundry service providers;
 20. funeral homes, crematoriums, cremation, burial, mortuary services, and cemeteries;

- assist in compliance with legally mandated activities or to assist a person in the exercise of constitutional rights, including but not limited to services required by a court order, a court rule, a fiduciary duty, a duty to the person's client, or an ethical obligation;
35. businesses and agencies that provide and help to determine eligibility for basic needs including food, cash assistance, medical coverage, childcare, vocational services, or rehabilitation services;
 36. adoption agencies;
 37. labor union essential activities, including the administration of health and welfare funds and personnel checking on the well-being and safety of members providing services in Essential Businesses provided that these checks should be done by telephone or remotely where possible;
 38. professional services, such as legal or accounting services, when related to the necessary activities of Essential Businesses;
 39. operations identified by the area colleges and Universities of the State of Missouri together with such individuals who have been authorized by these colleges and Universities to work on-site at premises for operational continuity including any travel authorized by the colleges and Universities for such individuals;
 40. adult detention facilities and juvenile justice facilities or similar operations; and
 41. businesses or independent providers that provide childcare or other dependent services but only to the extent that they comply with Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services regulations and take reasonable actions to comply with Social Distancing Requirements.
 42. any other businesses or services not listed herein that have been deemed as essential by the Federal Government of the United States of America.
- G. "Essential Government Functions" means all services needed to ensure the continuing operation of federal, state, or local government departments, offices, agencies, officials, political subdivisions, entities created by intergovernmental agreement, essential court functions as determined by the Presiding Judge or the Presiding Judge's designee, and any other government functions necessary to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of the public;
- H. "Essential Critical Infrastructure" means operation and maintenance of essential critical infrastructure sectors whose assets, systems, and networks, whether physical or virtual, are considered so vital that their incapacitation or destruction would have a debilitating effect on security, economic security, public health or safety, or any combination thereof and more fully identified by the US Department of Homeland Security. See <https://www.cisa.gov/identifying-critical-infrastructure-during-covid-19>.
- I. "Essential Products and Services" means products and services that are necessary for Essential Activities, Essential Government Functions, Essential Critical Infrastructure, Essential Travel, Essential

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Businesses, Minimum Basic Operations, or Healthcare Operations (including ancillary operations, maintenance, and support activities that are necessary to deliver the Essential Products and Services);

J. "Essential Travel" means travel that is necessary to serve any of the following purposes:

1. travel related to Essential Activities, Essential Government Functions, Essential Critical Infrastructure, Essential Travel, Essential Businesses, Minimum Basic Operations, or Healthcare Operations;
 2. travel to care for elderly, minors, dependents, persons with disabilities, or other vulnerable or High Risk people;
 3. travel to an Essential Business to purchase goods or services from the Essential Business;
 4. travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services;
 5. travel to return to a place of Residence from outside the jurisdiction;
 6. travel required by court order;
 7. travel required by directions from law enforcement personnel with authority; and
 8. travel required for non-residents to return to their place of Residence outside the County.
- K. "Gathering" means an occasion when people come together as a group, whether formal or informal and whether public or private;
- L. "Health" means the physical, mental, psychological, or psychiatric health of any person;

M. "Healthcare Operations" means hospitals, clinics, dentists, doctors, physicians, nurses, medical assistants, social workers, speech pathologists, diagnostic and therapeutic technicians and technologists, respiratory therapists, occupational and physical therapists, public health and community health workers, blood donation related organizations, organizations collecting blood, organizations collecting plasma, organizations collecting platelets, reproductive health care providers, eye care centers (including those that sell glasses and contact lenses), substance abuse counselors, pharmacies, pharmaceutical and biotechnology companies, doctor offices, dentist offices, healthcare facilities, healthcare suppliers, home healthcare services providers, mental health providers, any ancillary healthcare services, research and laboratory services, hospital and laboratory personnel, walk-in health facilities, elder care, medical wholesale and distribution, veterinary care, veterinarians, animal health services, workers providing COVID-19 testing, workers that perform critical clinical research needed for the COVID-19 response, facilities licensed pursuant to state constitutional amendment, the design and construction of healthcare and research related facilities including businesses that support the function and care for healthcare entities, and manufacturers and distributors of personal protective equipment, durable medical equipment, or other equipment used in the provision of healthcare. This definition shall be construed broadly to avoid any impacts to the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined, however "Healthcare

Operations" does not include fitness and exercise gyms, esthetician services, tattoo parlors, tanning facilities, spas, massage facilities, or similar facilities;

N. "High Risk" means a person who is any one of the following: (a) over sixty years of age; (b) has a chronic health condition such as heart disease, lung disease, or diabetes; (c) is immune-compromised; or (d) is pregnant;

O. "Intentional" means an act done with a purpose or with deliberation;

P. "Minimum Basic Operations" means the minimum necessary activities to maintain the value of a business's inventory, provide security, process payroll or employee benefits, or to facilitate employees of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their Residences;

Q. "Necessary Services or Supplies" means services, supplies, or funds needed to engage in Essential Activities and support Essential Critical Infrastructure;

R. "Organizes" means intentionally coordinate, to make arrangements for, or to make preparations for an event or an activity;

S. "Prohibited Activities" means any of the following:

1. any gathering of ten or more people in a single space or room, unless otherwise specifically permitted by this Order; or

2. activities regarding places of public amusement, whether indoors or outdoors, including but not limited to locations with amusement rides, carnivals, amusement parks, water parks, museums, arcades, fairs, children's play centers, playgrounds (including children's play structures in public or private parks), funplexes, bowling alleys, movie and other theatres, concert and music halls, country clubs, golf clubs (with the narrow exceptions of playing golf where there is no shared equipment by the participants and driving ranges where Social Distancing Requirements are strictly followed and enforced), social clubs, and athletic clubs. An exception shall exist for outdoor parks and trails where no shared equipment is utilized by the patrons.

T. "Residence" means a house, a condominium unit, an apartment unit, a dwelling, a hotel room, a motel room, a shared rental unit, shelters, or similar facilities but extends only within the bounds of the person's ownership, the person's leasehold interest, or the space occupied in a hotel, motel or shared rental unit and does not include common areas;

U. "Social Distancing Requirements" means the social distancing recommendations of the CDC which include maintaining at least six-foot social distancing from other individuals, washing hands with soap and water for at least twenty seconds as frequently as possible or using hand sanitizer with more than sixty percent alcohol, covering coughs or sneezes with something other than hands, regularly cleaning high-touch surfaces, and not shaking hands, or as otherwise defined by order; and


V. "Travel" means moving from place to place.


Application with other laws. Unless otherwise specifically provided or suspended in this Order, any order of the Director, or any Executive Order, this Order shall not supplant, supersede, replace, rescind, amend, or modify any other law, ordinance, rule, regulation, or permit condition or requirement, including but not limited to those that may apply to Essential Business or Essential Activities.


Enforcement. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a Class A misdemeanor punishable by up to one-year in jail, up to a \$2,000 fine, or any combination of such jail time and fine. See RSMo Sec. 192.300 and 192.320.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and in effect from and after its passage and adoption. Should any provision with the Ordinance be adjudged invalid, said determination shall not affect the validity of the balance of this Ordinance.



IN REF. ORDER NO 5 Press Release for Ordinance No. 2020-2- “A Social Distancing Ordinance”

PRESS RELEASE

Today the Adair County Commission reviewed and voted on a Social Distancing Ordinance in response to the Covid-19 pandemic that will go into effect beginning at 12:01 a.m. Monday April 6, 2020. The Commission first would like to thank those businesses and Citizens of Adair County that have stepped up as leaders in the fight against this virus. Most of our citizens have followed those suggestions provided by our President and Governor. Most of our businesses have already made the necessary accommodations or have temporarily closed their doors for the time being. A majority of these businesses are small, locally owned businesses and we recognize the sacrifice you and your employees have made to help protect others.

The unfortunate thing is that there are still those who have chosen not to follow the directives provided thus, placing others at risk. Additionally, the spread of this virus has continued to grow here in Adair County. While there is a directive currently in place from the Director of the Department of Health and Senior Services the enforcement of that directive lies with the local Health Departments. The passing of this ordinance takes the enforcement of the directives away from the Health Department and places it with law enforcement. The Adair County Health Department is engaged in efforts to protect our citizens and does not have the time, people, experience or other necessary resources to enforce the DHS order, however, the County law enforcement officers do. With that said, we are not asking to create a police state. We want to educate, encourage and as a last resort enforce this ordinance. This ordinance is simply another tool in the arsenal to fight against the spread of this contagious virus.

You will see that the City and County Ordinances read very similarly. The Adair County Prosecuting Attorney and the City of Kirksville's Attorney have worked together on finalizing these ordinances. These ordinances mirror others that have been passed in the State of Missouri and incorporate the guidelines provided by the Federal and State Governments. The Commission discussed whether there should be a sunset clause in this ordinance. It was determined that the uncertainty of the situation did not allow for such a clause at this time.

This ordinance will not affect the daily lives of most of our citizens and businesses, because they are already engaged in this behaviour. This ordinance does not limit your ability to go on walks as a family, to hike, ride a bike, go to the grocery store or engage in other essential activities. What it does is limit the size of gatherings, the types of businesses that are able to be open and certain types of activities. We want to encourage the Citizens of Adair County to enjoy the outdoors, to utilize local businesses for essential needs while exercising social distancing guidelines. Additionally, we ask that you limit the number of people per household that enter and shop at essential businesses. Those essential businesses are not places for family outings or a place to meet up with friends. We appreciate the steps that essential businesses are taking to ensure the safety of the citizens of Adair County. We also ask for their continued help in asking these businesses to encourage those who enter their stores to limit the number of individuals per household as well as discouraging the use of their stores for family outings or public gatherings. Our hope is that the need for this ordinance is short lived, but as our number of positive cases continues to grow we feel that this is the appropriate step at this time.
